Our vision remains the same: a free and restored life for <u>all</u> sex trafficked & exploited girls, and their children. All our actions are carried out with this mission in mind and we try to treat each of our beneficiaries with sensitivity and responsibility.

Let's see again this year everything that the Organization accomplished in 2023 for the relief and social reintegration of the beneficiaries but also for the public awareness.

ACTIVITY AREAS 1. ACCOMODATION

Regarding our Hospitality program, since January 2022, we have been operating 2 Safe Houses, in undisclosed locations with capacity of hosting 14 beneficiaries in total and their children.

We also have two accommodation apartments for the Transitional Housing Program of Phase 2 of the Day Program.

As you probably remember, in 2022 we proceeded with the purchase of a plot of land with the aim of building an owned safe house specially designed for the needs of the demographic we serve.

In July 2023, the foundation ceremony took place and construction immediately began. The project continues without any interruption and is going very well, according to the plans. With the foundation and masonry complete, we are currently in the third stage out of six in total – the electrical wiring and plumbing. We are getting closer step by step to the completion of the project and this fills us with joy and optimism.

2. ALIMENTATION

Regarding our activities in the field of Alimentation, in 2023 we granted all our beneficiaries a weekly allowance which they need to manage in order to meet, among other things, the nutritional needs of themselves and their children.

We received regular donations from food banks and other organizations which covered a significant part of the nutritional needs of our beneficiaries.

We also arranged group meals for the beneficiaries, staff and volunteers as part of strengthening interpersonal relationships given the multiculturalism of our community.

3. EDUCATION & TRAINING

A.DAY PROGRAM

1. In 2023, we had a total of 19 beneficiaries and 13 children in the program. In particular, we offered courses for inner empowerment and acquiring life skills and knowledge such as anger management, self-esteem, budgeting, English, etc.

B. OTHER TRAININGS

1.We train the interpreters and caregivers of our Safe Houses, raising awareness about the issue of sexual exploitation and training them based on the specialized needs of the demographic we serve. In 2023, we trained 2 Farsi-speaking interpreters and 7 caregivers.

2. We trained 2 teams from Italy, from respective organizations, who came specifically to see how our Program operates.

C. INTERNSHIP

Last year, we had the opportunity to welcome interns who did their internship in our organization. Three (3) interns did their internship at the Organization mainly from the United States.

D.SEMINARS

Last year, 4 training seminars were held for staff and beneficiaries on specialized topics, seminars on:

- \checkmark Emotional trauma and its treatment.
- \checkmark Social media safety.
- ✓ Trafficking and protection from it.
- ✓ Healthy interpersonal relationships.

4. DAY CARE & 5. EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Regarding child care and employment, in 2023:

- ✓ We provided daily childcare & creative activities at our Day Center so that the beneficiary mothers could attend the classes.
- ✓ We offered special Child Care & Parenting skills courses.
- ✓ We organized parties for mothers-to-be.

6. HEALTH/MEDICAL SERVICES

In terms of health services, in 2023 we provided for:

- \checkmark The regular vaccination of children.
- ✓ The medical care and preventive examination of both the beneficiaries and their children.
- \checkmark The distribution of hygiene items.

7. PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT-PSYCHIATRIC MONITORING

Regarding the Psychological monitoring of the beneficiaries, in 2023, 100% of the participants in the Program:

 Took part in counseling sessions conducted at a mental health center and made significant progress. ✓ Specific cases were referred for psychiatric monitoring.

8. INTERPRETATION

We provided interpretation services during the Day Program classes but also during other activities, seminars, visits to doctors, hospitals, etc.

9. PROMOTING LABOUR MARKET INTEGRATION

In 2023 we started a special vocational training program in handicrafts (sewing, clay and leather) and jewelry in which all the beneficiaries participated on a paid basis. We also collaborated with other organizations in order to provide job positions to our beneficiaries.

10. ACTIONS PROMOTING INTERCULTURALISM

Since it opened its doors in April 2016, Community House Damaris has hosted women from more than 22 countries in Eastern Europe, Africa, Middle East, Greece, etc. Since then, we have served beneficiaries originating from Romania, Greece, Dominican Republic, Ghana, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Ivory Coast, Syria, Jordan, Ethiopia, Zimbabwe, Morocco, Uganda, Congo, Guinea, Venezuela, Cameroon, Eritrea, Afghanistan, Somalia, Cameroon, Eritrea, Afghanistan, Somalia etc. All these beneficiaries speak a wide range of languages, such as English, Arabic, Spanish, French, Greek, Farsi, Romanian etc.

In the context of the UNESCO Principles of Intercultural Education:

- ✓ We provide lessons in emotional intelligence & Greek and world culture that contribute to respect and solidarity between individuals, but also between ethnic, social, cultural and religious groups.
- ✓ In addition, we organize multicultural activities with a dominant element of different national cuisines, customs, etc.

11. ESTABLISHING COOPERATION NETWORKS

In 2023, the organization further expanded its networking to work with other networks active in the same field with the common goal of combating sexual exploitation and trafficking. In this context:

12. AWARENESS OF THE RECEPTION SOCIETY

• 14. INFORMATION-SERVICE- COUNSELING

Through the caregivers of the Organization and the social service, in 2023 we offered:

- Professional Counseling with the aim of empowering them as they are directed accordingly to discover their potential and talents and utilize them in the work sector.
- Goal Setting program for each beneficiary according to the needs of each case.

B. is a single mother from Uganda who managed to escape prostitution and reintegrate into society with the help offered by Community House Damaris to which she was referred in October 2019.

When she lived in her country, she was under a lot of pressure to help her family financially. A friend connected her with a woman who helped her prepare her papers and travel abroad to find a decent job. There, she discovered that this job was prostitution into which he was forced. After a few months, she became pregnant and had to visit the hospital. There she managed to escape. After spending many nights on a park bench, she got in touch with a smuggler who took her to Lesvos island, Greece. From the refugee camp there, she was referred to the House Damaris which welcomed her.

As she has shared in the past, "Damaris stood by me like a family." She attended the recovery program, had several counseling sessions, participated in the Bible study and also received vocational training.

Today, she lives with her son independently in one of the organization's transitional housing apartments. She works and builds her life with freedom and dreams for the future.

Program Results

In total, until December 2023:

- 58 women have joined our program.
- 73 children have had mothers with program involvement.
- 32 children have been hosted by Damaris House.
- 4 of the 58 women have been one-time program repeaters.
- 9 of the 58 women have been emergency placements only, staying less than 30 days.

• 8 languages are spoken (Greek, Romanian, English, French, Ukrainian, Farsi, Spanish and Arabic).

- 10-12 women served on average each year.
- 100% of the program beneficiaries underwent a psychiatric evaluation and psychotherapy, achieving significant progress.

• 100% of the program beneficiaries and their children were provided with primary health prevention.

Excluding emergency cases (9 women), 49 women have attended the program. Of these 49, 37 women are now considered to have a stable social status and have shown significant progress in their rehabilitation.

All of the above give the program a success rate of 76%.
